


Why Does CU Do Research?

Research is a critical part of CU's statutory role and mission:

- The Boulder campus of the university of Colorado shall be a comprehensive graduate <u>research</u> university (Section 23-20-101 (1)(a), C.R.S. (2024))
- The Denver campus of the university of Colorado shall be an urban comprehensive undergraduate and graduate <u>research</u> university (Section 23-20-101 (1)(b), C.R.S. (2024))
- The Colorado Springs campus of the university of Colorado shall be a comprehensive baccalaureate and specialized graduate <u>research</u> university (Section 23-20-101 (1)(c), C.R.S. (2024))
- [The health sciences center campus of the university of Colorado] is affiliated with the university of Colorado hospital and other health-care facilities that offer settings for education, clinical practice, and basic and applied <u>research</u> (Section 23-20-101 (1)(d), C.R.S. (2024))

- Of the 31 public institutions of higher education in Colorado, only 4 governing boards are research institutions

Why Does CU Do Research?

- Improves student educational experiences
 - Influences student decisions about where to study
 - Helps prepare students for the workforce and future education
- Increases economic impact
 - Contributes to development of startup companies and patents
 - Attracts philanthropic contributions
- Enhances university reputation and name recognition
 - Supports student and faculty recruitment and retention
- Strengthens communities
 - Benefits the local, state, and national community through advances in healthcare, science, technology, and other disciplines
 - Develops reciprocally beneficial relationships between community and university

Awards and Gifts


- \$1.6 billion in total awards + gifts supporting research

Gifts Only


- \$191.6 million in total gifts supporting research

Total research funding, in thousands (public university systems)




How Does CU Compare to its Peers?

Federal Sponsored Research


- CU campuses negotiate with an assigned federal agency to set rates to recover facilities and administrative (F&A) costs associated with sponsored research
- The final, negotiated rate is less than actual costs

State and Local Sponsored Research


 The federal negotiated rate may be proposed to state and local partners, but nonfederal sponsors do not always agree to pay the federal negotiated rate, further lowering recovered costs




Underfunded Facilities and Administration Costs

CU Boulder: Notable Research Accomplishments

- AB Nexus/ARPA-H
 - Team awarded up to \$39 million to develop therapies to end osteoarthritis
- National Science Foundation (NSF) Regional Innovation Engines
 - CO-WY selected as one of 10 inaugural regions
 - Award could net \$160 million over 10 years
- Space Weather Center (NASA)
 - \$10 million for "Space Weather Operational Readiness Development Center"
 - Led by CU Boulder Space Weather Technology, Research and Education Center
- Excellence in the Arts & Humanities
 - Dimitri Nakassis (Classics) won NEH Fellowship
 - Elspeth Dusinberre (Classics) won Guggenheim Fellowship
 - Center for Asian Studies won grant from U.S. Department of Education
 - National Resource Center
 - Brian Valente-Quinn (French) won Fulbright Global Scholar Award





CU Denver: Notable Research Accomplishments

- Building capacity through support of research teams and individual researchers
- Grand Challenges Initiative
 - 100+ faculty, 100+ students engaged in convergence research
 - Research teams in AI, data science, climate, cybersecurity, health, smart cities, and sustainable urban infrastructure
 - 22 principal investigators have received 30 external grant awards totaling \$6.4 million
- Seed Grants Program for Innovative Research and Creative Work
 - Supports preliminary work and grant proposal development efforts
 - Competitive program
 - Granted 33 awards since spring 2023
- High-impact research
 - Christopher Weible (School of Public Affairs): Nearly 20,000 Google Scholar citations
 - Michael Moore (Department of Integrative Biology) and others published article in National Academy of Sciences (March 2024)




CU Anschutz: Notable Research Accomplishments

- School of Medicine ranked 23rd in country for federal research funding
 - CAR-T therapy for advanced, treatment-resistant blood cancer or lymphoma
 - Developed, manufactured and clinically administered at CU Anschutz Campus
 - CU Cancer Center received \$74.8 million in research funding in FY 2022-23
- Center for Drug Discovery School of Pharmacy
 - Specialized resource to screen thousands of agents via robotic platform
 - Identifying novel drug therapies
- Barbara Davis Center
 - Transforming care for Type 1 diabetes
 - Nationally recognized, leading clinical trials, basic science discovery
- School of Dental Medicine
 - Multi-material 3D print processing of antimicrobial and antifungal dental prosthetics
 - Improved performance and cost of customized dentures
- Graduate School at CU Anschutz
 - Over 200 peer reviewed publications since 2020 and three Gilliam Fellows
 - CU Anschutz ranked 11th nationally in NIH graduate funding
- Shringix Vaccine discovered at CU Anschutz
