Dr. David H. Jackson, Jr., a distinguished scholar, educator, and higher education administrator from Atlanta, Georgia, earned his Bachelor of Science in History Education and Master of Applied Social Sciences in Public Administration from Florida A&M University (FAMU). He began his career as a financial analyst at International Paper Company and later taught at Watkins Overton High School in Memphis, where he was honored as "Most Influential Teacher" for two of three years. He earned a PhD in History from the University of Memphis at age 28, and began teaching at FAMU, where he rose to Full Professor in seven years and served as Chair of the Department of History, Political Science, Public Administration, Geography and African American Studies for ten years.

A prolific scholar, Dr. Jackson has published 6 scholarly books, dozens of articles, short essays, and book reviews, and delivered more than 100 presentations on various topics in African American history and higher education administrative leadership. Two of his notable books include *A Chief Lieutenant of the Tuskegee Machine: Charles Banks of Mississippi* (2002) and *Emmett J. Scott: Power Broker of the Tuskegee Machine* (2023). He has been recognized with numerous honors, including the FAMU Teacher of the Year Award (twice), the FAMU Research Excellence Award, and the Equity Award from the American Historical Association for mentoring over 35 students to PhDs.

He served as Associate Provost and Dean of the School of Graduate Studies, Research, and Continuing Education at FAMU for six years, and as Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at North Carolina Central University for three years. He is a member of several professional and social organizations, including Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity. Dr. Jackson is married to Dr. Sheila M. Jackson, and they have two children, both successful professionals.
